Photographic Artist Review

Warren Keelan (b.) works out of Wollongong N.S.W. and is a keen seascape and ocean photographer interpreting what he sees through the medium of digital photography.

He has always had a fascination with nature, especially the ocean and its ever changing forms, and is compelled to capture and share what he feels are special and unique moments in the sea. Warren loves the raw, unpredictable nature of water in motion and the way sunlight brings it all to life, from both above and below the surface. His challenge is creating an image that hopefully tells a story or leaves an impression on the viewer.

In 2013 he opened his first photo gallery in Wollongong. Warren is a multi-international award winning photographer: International Landscape Photographer of the Year, International Photo Awards,

International Monochrome Awards, Epson International Pano, Siena International & International Loupe Awards and has received local and international recognition via TV, radio and newspapers.

Interview via Vagabond Photographic:

What is the worst piece of advice you have heard given to someone that wants to make a career out of photography?

After a short role as a fishing photojournalist I found myself being drawn to landscape and ocean photography. I began selling my printed artworks and saw an opportunity to change my role and pursue another avenue. Strangely during that time, I was told something by another photographer along the lines of 'you're not going to be able to make a living of selling prints of the ocean'. I think I still use that as motivation to do what I do today. Don't let anyone tell you what you want to achieve is out of reach.

What is the one aspect you find the most difficult about running a photographic business?

Time and lack thereof. I shoot almost daily and open/run my gallery 5-6 days a week. In between that I process images & orders, meet with clients and travel as much as I can. All of that on top of making sure to invest time into my relationship with my wife. If there's a way we could clone ourselves I'd be all over it.

If there was one destination you could travel to and photograph where would it be?

I've wanted to visit Tonga for many years now and I'm fortunate to be able to be heading that way in 2018 to photograph whales. However, I would also love to travel to Tahiti. To witness Teahupoo exploding across that reef would be mind blowing, but I'd also love to photograph the gin clear waters of Moorea and Bora Bora and its inhabitants. The Tahitian landscape would be incredible to witness from the water.

And from an edited article for Peta Pixel by Michael Zhang in 2019. In Warren's words:

"Many of my images are conceived days, weeks or even months before they become pictures. They're a combination of thoughts and ideas that eventually translate into photographs but there's a percentage that just happen while in the moment. These are actually some of my favourite images, either becoming keepers or the basis for new ideas and future works." Although he uses a wide range of lenses for his work, one of his primary workhorses is his 70-200mm f/2.8 IS II. "Having a telephoto with you in the water really opens the door to creativity," Keelan says. "It's a heavier lens compared to most but it's one I find hard to put down, especially with how versatile and sharp that thing is."

"The most challenging and enjoyable aspect of making images of water is that it's an element you have zero control over," Keelan says. "The everchanging, unpredictable nature of ocean water is also some of the many reasons I love making images of it and in it. When you swim into large and powerful waves with a camera, you are at the mercy of the ocean". "Although you can anticipate what may happen whilst you're out within it, it's that surprise of capturing something completely random and unique which makes it all the more rewarding. I also enjoy the personal challenge of employing different lenses with alternate focal depths to find new angles and perspectives."

"When I first began shooting water and waves, I was hitting the shutter a lot more than I needed," the photographer says. "I ended up with way too many unusable images and made more mistakes than anything but it was a great way to find what really challenged me. Once I worked out what I was doing (actually I'm still working that out) I began shooting fewer frames and made fewer images, but the images I did snap were closer what I wanted to make and I was dumping less data."

Keelan estimates that he shoots an average of 200 to 500 frames over the span of a couple of hours in the water.

"I shoot everything in RAW so I'm able to work on flat image files in order to recreate the tones, colours, moods, and emotions I saw and felt when I clicked the shutter," Keelan says. "To be honest I still have a lot to learn when it comes to post-processing, especially with underwater seascapes and portraits of whales, sharks, turtles, etc. but so far I'm happy with how my images transpose into print.

"The great thing about it all is there's always more to learn!"
